Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Award and the 2022 Medical Society of Virginia's Salute to Service Award.

Dr. Casey sees patients of all ages and genders for primary care at UVA Health. Her interests include providing competent and compassionate care to LGBTQ+ patients — and teaching faculty, students, and residents to do the same.
